Starting Block Skills Sessions

We will be providing skills workshops on research, practice and writing skills for new postgraduate students. For some of you, they will refresh your existing knowledge, and for others of you they will cover core skills to develop. This will include activity around quantitative and qualitative research, and an overview of foundation psychology concepts. We will also look at writing at career development. If you do not have a psychology degree or feel less confident about these topics, then you are strongly encouraged to attend, although attendance is not compulsory.

Engage with your programme

Read around your subject

Below we have included some details of pre-reading that you might wish to undertake prior to starting at UWE in September. These include some recommended books, and further useful links and resources to engage you.

Please note these are optional and are not required for the specific modules you will be undertaking for your MSc. Specific readings for your modules will be given after you enrol. Here are some of our recommended titles for you to indulge in before we get started.

Introductory Books

There are many good introductory books on Business, Occupational and Organisational Psychology. Most of these give you a feel for the areas covered in the MSc Business and Organisational Psychology. When you join, we will give you online access to *Organizational Psychology: A Scientist-Practitioner Approach* by Steve Jex, which has some general readings for the course. You could also purchase this text if you would like. Here are three further recommendations:

- Arnold et al. (2020) *Work Psychology: Understanding Human Behaviour in the Workplace*
This is a fairly comprehensive introductory academic textbook to work psychology, which explores many of the topic areas you will be exploring on the programme.
- Sutton (2020) *Work Psychology in Action*
This is a good and well-written introductory academic textbook to give you a feel of the areas covered in Business and Organisational Psychology. It also has an applied focus.
- Friedman (2015) *The Best Place to Work*
This is more of a “popular” book about business and organisational psychology, but it comes from an evidence-based psychological angle. It is written by a social psychologist and covers some interesting areas where psychology contributes to understanding organisations. There is an associated website with extra resources.

Further Reading Links

There are many good resources on the internet about Business and Organisational Psychology. Many of these are updated regularly. Discussion about the role of psychology at work are popular topics across a range of media. There are also discussion forums on LinkedIn that you could join and follow too.
