Before you start

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the week commencing 15 September for Starting Block and the beginning of your programme.

Starting Block will help you settle into university and to help you get to know your teaching team and course mates. We will help you find your way around, get used to our systems, and practice the skills you need to make a strong start. Engage with your programme

Start your learning

The beauty of studying language is that you can explore the varied and fascinating things that people say and write while going about your normal everyday life. Here are some suggestions to consider between now and September. Choose a few that appeal to your interests and give them a go:

- How polite can you be to Alexa or Siri (etc.) and still get the answer that you were looking for? (Ask for instance, “would you mind awfully if it’s not too much trouble just telling me what the weather might be like tomorrow, if you get a chance?”) Can the AI cope with the different human speech patterns that you throw at it? Are there ways of making requests of humans which an AI assistant simply can’t understand?
- Compare some dating reality TV shows from the UK with those overseas. What are some differences in the ways that people offer and respond to compliments? Where do these differences stem from?
- Browse through some [TED Talks on the topic of Language](#). At various points in the course, we will look at ideas brought up in some of these – and you’ll see that while they might be persuasive, they aren’t always right!
- Go through the archives of [Word of Mouth](#) (Radio 4) on the BBC Sounds website. You might like to start with episodes featuring our very own Prof. Richard Coates on names and naming.
- Notice the power dynamics involved when people of different status interact with each other. Shows like 24 Hours in Police Custody, Succession, or even Prime Minister’s Questions are full of power imbalances which influence who can speak, when they speak, what they say and how they say it.
- Keep your eyes peeled for examples of prescriptive thinking about language in the press and/or on social media (including comments sections). Consider why the author wants to tell people what is right and wrong in language use.
- If you have any babies or toddlers in your life, can you detect any patterns in how they pick up and use different words and phrases? Are there certain word classes (verb, noun, etc) that they use more? How do they use language (both verbal and non-verbal) to get what they need from their caregivers?
- Read for enjoyment! Anything you like – non-fiction, historical fiction, sci-fi, fantasy, romance, etc. Get into the habit of reading regularly.

Read around your subject

A key skill which is required to achieve a high level of success within your chosen programme is the ability to think critically about key issues and practices. To help you

to enhance these skills and be ready to engage with your studies, you should start to read and research around your subject before you arrive. Explore the [Library](#) web pages to see the wide range of resources available to you once you become a UWE Bristol student.
